
If it is foggy, can you please come forward, out of your cars etc so we can see you?

The Scouts kicked off the new term with a Halloween party which had a Christmas theme. The scouts produced pumpkin Santa's & a snowman!




With the following week being bonfire night, fire lighting, sparklers & marshmallows were in order

Summer Camp

It has been an odd year, but we started the second half of the year with an actual camp! Despite the rather tight rules, the Explorers managed a summer camp by camping in hammocks and so managed to have a socially distanced 'tent'. It was an odd week with constant warnings of thunderstorms and downpours that seemed to pass us by. No complaint from us. It was a fairly typical Explorer camp with a strong focus on food and baking with the explorers making bread and pies and a new favourite, pineapple in a cinnamon caramel sauce. It



was a tough start to the camp as everyone was trying to recall how to camp after such a long break but they explorers managed it well.

Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Expedition

A lot of the second half of the year was dedicated to getting back up to speed with camping and hiking with a lot of skills lost during the lock-down period and so the unit has been working on navigation with a teaching hike from Kelty back home, stopping off at the Sculpture area and admiring some of the big artwork and mining equipment. We covered route-finding, finding our location from landmarks and calculating walking speeds and times. We also brushed up on first aid, emergencies and incident handling and the most important thing (for the Explorers at least) food.



The Expedition will be covered in detail by the Explorers themselves but I will say that their navigation was spot-on despite a moving forest and their camping skills were excellent as they were out in the hills in a gale and survived without so much as a lost peg.

We do need to brush up on observation skills when they can walk alongside a field full of alpaca and not notice.



Christmas Dinner

It has become a tradition that the Explorers plan and cook a traditional Christmas dinner. This year it was held in the hall with the dinner planned like a military campaign but it all went well. There was Turkey, roast and mashed potatoes, kilted sausages, stuffing, roast veg and sprouts with Christmas pudding, sponge pudding, ice cream and mince pies all washed down with alcohol free prosecco and Irn Bru. This was followed by a food coma, a massive washing-up session then secret Santa and an overnight movie marathon.



In addition to all the training for the expedition and camping there was time for fun with a massive Nerf war with Explorers (and some leaders) running around with Nerf guns, we had a retro gaming night with consoles and games going back to the 70s, a canoeing session at Lochore thanks to Greasy and Dave.

Our Expedition in the Pentland Hills

We began our expedition at Bonaly Scout Centre, just southwest of Edinburgh. Six of us were participating in the expedition and thus, all equipment had to be stored between six rucksacks, said equipment included: two stoves, two hike tents, three two litre bottles of water, bin bags and many other things plus two days' worth of collective provisions spread roughly between us. The route chosen was to take us through woodland, across valleys, uphill and along reservoirs. We took 2 maps inscribed with our routes to and from our designated campsite among the hills; these maps would change hands several times during our venture due to disputes over directions.



The beginning of our expedition saw us trail through the woodland road near Bonaly, tackle an immense uphill climb and recuperate by the Bonaly reservoir. The hills only got more challenging as we went further, and though many stretches of the journey were easy walks along flat-ish terrain (and many of the harder parts came with a rewarding view) we were all exhausted and irritable by the last leg of our journey to our wild camping location which was, according to our map from 2016, amongst a large square patch of trees. Upon arriving at our campsite (which was in fact beside a group of trees that had seemingly been flattened sometime since 2016, thus explaining the initial confusion over where our campsite was in relation to where we could see a large patch of trees) we realised that it was far too cold up at 400-odd feet with no hope of cover from the elements being provided by the sad lump of lumber behind us (honestly Laura) to do anything but putting up

tents, making dinner, eating dinner, and going to sleep.

After having noodles (and in my case lukewarm tea), we retreated to our tents at six o'clock in the afternoon and played cards with cold, shaky hands until eight.



At around 7am, though I'm not sure on the time exactly, we were cooking breakfast and preparing to leave which involved putting rubbish into bin bags, tents into tent-bags and both now full bin-bags and tent-bags into our bag-bags. We were prepared to leave soon after this as we were eager to get the hard stretch of the journey over and done with. We walked through the morning fog over heather covered hills looking as if we had been pasted onto the cover of a shortbread tin. The route given to us for our return to Bonaly was easier than the route of the previous day and included even more reservoirs, woodland and yes, even a few hills, but not as many (and anyway we had gotten used to them by now).

As we made our way onto the last leg of our journey, where our two separate routes met, we walked along the path of by Bonaly Reservoir, down the downhill walk that was originally an intimidating climb and through the woods surrounding the campsite, we were relieved to be only a 2-hour long Mag lecture away from a hot meal and television. Me (Brodie, hi), Dominic, Matthew, Zara, Logan, and Sean had made it. And Dom completely missed the Alpacas!!!

Memorable Moments Dominic found a sheep skull, and I was almost tempted to take it home for a wall decoration, then realised that it was likely riddled with disease. I drunk custard straight out of the carton. Dominic and I nearly fell down a very high, steep, and dangerous hill. Dominic was plain old clumsy and stumbled whereas I hung from the edge to procure a £5 Trespass hat that had blown from my head.
